

English and Wellbeing Enhancement Series (EWES) - Frequently Asked Questions

- Q: What is the English and Wellbeing Enhancement Series (EWES)?
- A: EWES is an innovative, free English language enhancement service provided by The Australian National University to support students' wellbeing and transition to university life:
 - A series of 24 English language and wellbeing enhancement topics workshops, 2 hours per workshop;
 - Workshops run all year from Monday to Friday between 8am and 6pm, including lunchtime;
 - Workshops are repeated throughout the week and semester to accommodate your study load and schedule;
 - Workshops are delivered in a small group setting and run by qualified and experienced teachers;
 - No examinations or homework.
- Q: Who can apply?
- A: EWES is available to:
 - new international students (Undergraduate and Postgraduate) within their first 48 units of study;
 - continuing international students (UG and PG) within their first 48 units of study;
 - domestic students from non-English speaking backgrounds as defined in ANU policy;
 - students referred by the ANU Colleges to complete specific workshops as per ANU's
 Assessment arrangements for students from language backgrounds other than English
- Q: Why should I enrol in EWES?
- A: EWES will help you:
 - reach your potential and excel in your studies at ANU;
 - find more opportunities to practice your English for academic success;
 - meet other new international students, create a social network, and share your experiences at ANU College – our English Enhancement hub;
 - you may be eligible to apply for concessional assessment arrangements. See ANU's <u>Student</u> <u>assessment (coursework) policy;</u>
 - improve your language skills and increase your confidence through practical and interactive learning activities;
 - develop an understanding of how to apply for work and how to make the most of your time while living in Canberra.
- Q: What does it cost?
- A: EWES is a free service.

- Q: When does it start?
- A: On 24 February 2020, however, students can enrol in EWES Workshops anytime during the semester.
- Q: Will I receive credit towards my degree?
- A: No, but completing this series of workshops will help you gain confidence in your language skills that will contribute to your academic success at ANU.
- Q: Will I get a certificate?
- A: If you participate in 19 or more of the workshops you will receive a certificate of attendance.
- Q: How many workshops should I attend?
- A: To maximise the benefits you gain from these workshops, you are strongly encouraged to complete the series.
- Q: What if I cannot attend a workshop?
- A: Workshops are repeated throughout the week and the semester so you can attend on another day or time.
- Q: How long does it take to complete the series of workshops?
- A: EWES is designed to suit your study load. You can finish the series in a semester or you can complete it over the year.
- Q: Where are the workshops held?
- A: The workshops are held at ANU College in the Fulton Muir Building, 95 Daley Road on the ANU campus.

What will I learn in the workshops?

Living in Australia

The excitement of studying and living in a new country may soon be replaced by the challenges of living away from home. An understanding of the different phases of adjustment could help you settle into your new environment a little more easily.

Rights as a part-time worker

You may be among the many international students who have part time jobs while studying at ANU. If so, it is very important that you understand your rights as a casual part time worker.

Join this session to understand your rights as a part-time worker in Australia and develop the language and confidence to express any concerns you may have in your workplace.

Using your resources

In your studies, you will need to depend on the work of other scholars in your field to support your ideas.

Communicating objectively

The purpose of academic communication is to express your ideas clearly using a combination of sentence types that are accurately constructed to convey the intended meaning.

Participating in discussion is a common activity in university life. Therefore developing your discussion skills is important to your academic success.
